Board of Directors Report:

2017–2018 Academic Year

The C&G Board continues to work hard on your behalf to support smooth year-in/year-out operations at the Corner and to assure that C&G remains relevant and impactful into the future. This past year, the C&G Board kept to its tradition of monthly update phone calls from September to June, as well as two formal, in-person Board meetings at the Corner in mid-November and late-April. The April Board meeting is one part of three C&G-related weekend events, including Spring Feast and the new delegation welcome brunch.

In addition to our 20 formal Board members from the delegations of 1959 to 2008, Joel Heathcote '61, who serves as the Merlin-of-Merlins and our communications maestro, is a constant presence. The current Arthur and immediate-past Arthur (and occasional other alumni) are also invited to attend the non-executive portion of Board meetings, usually along with a couple of current delegation officers.

We'd like to thank each of our fellow Board members for their many hours of work and invaluable contributions! If you have an interest in joining us in the future, please let us know.

Just to give you a sense of how we operate, the agenda for our meetings typically includes the following:

- review of several C&G operational topics (delegation experience, alumni experience, facilities management, communications & branding, financial management, human capital) to ensure smooth day-to-day running of the order; and
- ongoing exploration of strategic challenges and opportunities, as well as potential future directions to ensure C&G's long-term vitality and impact.

We are proud that C&G remains unique at Dartmouth, based on its demonstrated capacity to create a transformative senior year experience by bringing together in residence and shared fellowship a diverse group of men and women of strong character, high ideals, and proven achievement. As all of us who have been through this experience know, a primary goal of C&G, in addition to creating an opportunity for life-long friendships, is to deepen the capacity of its members to engage constructively with those of differing views and backgrounds and to make a


positive contribution to society. At its best, C&G does this by promoting an orientation toward thoughtful leadership, strong character, deep self-reflection, constructive dialog, and inclusion.

Alumni Surveys

A key metric of success that the Board watches carefully is the fact that our alumni continue to say that C&G was one of their most valued Dartmouth experiences. Anecdotally, we consistently receive such feedback from alumni. However, this was more rigorously examined and validated via our 2013 all-alumni survey, developed by Brad Brinegar '77. This important survey continues to be posted on the C&G website, and it provided invaluable learnings and feedback for the Board.

This year, the Board questioned whether there have been meaningful changes in the experience and perception among the more recent delegations. To answer this and to ensure we're hearing from these recent delegations, Brad and Tig Tillinghast '93 helped us launch an updated survey based on the one done in 2013 but focused only on the delegations of 2002 to 2017. Below and on page 3 are a few slides from the "findings" presentation that Brad prepared and we reviewed at our April board meeting. There are changes and differences to be sure, but the enthusiasm of alumni for the C&G experience remains very high! This is encouraging news.

Operational Highlights

We are pleased with several important advances that have been made over recent years in how C&G operates. These reflect the tireless efforts by a number of dedicated Board members and alumni. Here are some of the notable contributors:

- The Housers: Dick Jaeger '59, Jim Wooster '59, Denny Goodman '60, and Tig Tillinghast '93 work to keep the Corner in great shape, despite a growing amount of deferred maintenance;
- Long-time treasurer Tracy Walsh '91 maintains our financial controls and stability;
- Abe Holland '08 and Lena Martinez Wolfinger '08 are driving a consistency and cadence to the tapping process, as well as improving delegation-alumni interactions, including through formal orientations/retreats;
- Kerry Swarr '94 and Laurie Lopes '87 help organize C&G events at the Corner for the delegations returning for their June class reunions, (see page 5); and
- Joel Heathcote works to "ignite the Knights" via better alumni communications and outreach.

efforts required of our volunteers to make them happen.

Challenges & Opportunities

While we continue on our year-in and year-out activities, there are also several challenges that we are watching attentively as we work to assure that C&G's operating model is sustainable and to meet our responsibility as a Board for setting the organization's direction and ensuring its vitality. Chief among these is the reality that there are presently 14 officially recognized senior societies at Dartmouth, as well as perhaps six additional unofficial ones. This creates a "marketing and branding" challenge for C&G that is all the greater because, over the years, we have paid little regard to our external brand. In addition, given the extraordinary diversity that now exists across today's highly active yet increasingly "siloed" student body, as well as the present Senior Society Council reguirement that the names for all juniors to be tapped be submitted by Thanksgiving, the tapping process itself has become daunting and somewhat disruptive to the most recent delegations. Increasingly, tapping requires an unreasonable time commitment from a delegation that must start on its deliberations a week or two after fall term begins! We are finding that this is a schedule that interferes

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
with newly developing delegation dynamics and can dull the impact of the C&G transformation experience.

A final challenge is the following. At the same time as there has been a continued evolution of student expectations regarding the quality of both residential facilities and co-curricular "programming," there is active ongoing Dartmouth experimentation with novel residence-based programs, as well as an intense and broad-based focus on leadership development. These developments have greater potential impact on C&G as compared to the other senior societies, because we are the only one that provides a residential experience. We are keeping a close eye on all of this to assure that C&G maintains it relevance and importance to Dartmouth.

While we don't yet have cogent answers for any of the challenges—and, by being explicit about them with you, we want you to join us in being aware about them—we remain confident in C&G's future and in the ability of our 131-year-old organization to continue to adapt to changing times.

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Selected Senior Highlights



Andrew Sun

He is currently finishing up a thesis project that aims to simulate the time dependence of neutral-helium losses as a result of the Sun's solar activity cycle. He has also recently performed his senior recital in classical piano, playing works by Scarlatti, Beethoven, Chopin, and John Ireland.

As his last term ends, he hopes to write a leadership guide for the Sustainable Living Center, a house where he has been the undergraduate advisor for four terms. He has also been selected to speak at Masculinities at Dartmouth, a student organized panel that explores how male identities are defined and challenged at Dartmouth.

After college, Andrew plans to attend Columbia Law School, where he will be focusing in environmental law.

A review of Andrew's recital April 14, 2018: "On April 14th, Andrew Sun masterfully played the piano for his senior recital and mesmerized the audience as he performed works by Scarlatti, Beethoven, Chopin, and Ireland. Andrew's 60-minute performance was a roller-coaster ride of musical styles and emotion. From Scarlatti's baroque ornateness all the way to Ireland's soothing melodies, Andrew did not fail to keep the audience intrigued and attentive. His cool demeanor throughout the recital was only interrupted by the occasional smirk to demonstrate his confidence and mastery of the material. Needless to say, Andrew provided an entertaining and immaculate performance.

Most surprising of all is that Andrew is not a music major, but rather, he is a physics major. The best part is that he will be attending Columbia Law School in the fall. Is it even possible to be any more talented?"

Niamé Daffé

After graduation, Niamé will be doing an ORISE Fellowship at the Centers For Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) in Atlanta. She will be working with the Global and Border Health team, looking at disease migration across borders in West Africa and East Africa. This opportunity nicely brings together Niamé's two majors: biology and sociology.



It also speaks to her interest in global/public health, specifically on the continent of Africa, which is where she is from. To quote Niamé: "I am really excited about this opportunity and hope it will be an incredible learning experience and an opportunity to be exposed to the world of global/public health."

Niamé plans to be at the CDC for one year and is hoping to work for another year in this field before pursuing graduate school. While she is not entirely sure what degree she would like to pursue just yet, she hopes that this fellowship will help inform her decision.

As of now, Niamé is considering a Masters of Public Health (MPH), a Masters of Science (MS), or a PhD in either epidemiology or sociology.




Anirudh Udutha

After graduation, Anirudh will be staying in the Hanover area for another four years to attend the Geisel School of Medicine. Last summer, he participated in a Dickey Center internship with the Comprehensive Rural Health Project, a public health NGO in Jamkhed, India. Anirudh had the incredible opportunity to learn how two local doctors had

developed a network of women who were trained as village health workers to improve primary healthcare for their communities. This has led to substantial improvements in community health, especially for young mothers and children. At Geisel, Anirudh hopes to further learn how healthcare providers can best position themselves to address structural inequities while being embedded members of their local communities. Anirudh also hopes to extend his neuroscience thesis work, exploring neural pathways involved in addictive behaviors to potentially work at the intersection of substance-use disorders, mental healthcare, and maternal and neonatal health.

Spring Talent Show

The '18 delegation organized an in-house talent show for the first Saturday after Spring Break. The living room was equipped with a microphone, a full speaker set, and our newly tuned grand piano. Of course, the audience, which also included guests, enjoyed appetizers and wine as well. Hosted by the charming Brenna, our lineup of six performers exhibited a range of artistic talent and performance skill. Yesenia kicked the show off by screening her first ever production, *Bloom*, an expository film on LatinX masculinity at Dartmouth. Gustavo performed a poem, which has been a hit since the Voices 18W show. This was followed by Danica and Dan, who sang and accompanied with piano three awe-inspiring musical pieces. Finally, Andrew Sun performed a couple of the piano pieces he was meticulously preparing for his senior music recital.

Below is a sampling of events in a typical (!) year. Glance through it and add any that your delegation came up with. Come on now...what was the good stuff your year?

WELCOMING DINNER: at start of senior year. **FALL ORIENTATION/RETREAT:** make plans as a delegation to create a triumphant year!

Night weekend. Mixer for alums and students. Deadline for bios, headshots, and profiles all due for *The Castlegram*.

FALL BOARD MEETING: early November.

FIRST TAPS & WELCOMING TAP-PEES: late January; each delegation creates their own rituals for inductions.

INITIATION: special effects, blindfolds, candles, goblets, and flowers on the great RoundTable. Legendary props available: the sword, the suit of armor, canes.

DELEGATION ACTIVITIES:

Jousts/Road Trips/ Projects: working and playing together is bonding!

Treasure Hunt: as designed by Zoe Furlong '14, historian.

Dances/Parties/Dinners: consider *guests* (president, deans, etc.) and themes.

SECOND TAPS & WELCOMING TAPPEES: early April. **ELECTION OF OFFICERS**

C&G SPRING WEEKEND: last Saturday in April. **Spring Welcome Brunch:** for new delegation.
